Prof. S. H. Vines, of Oxford, has written strongly against Weismann; and Prof. Bower, of Glasgow, in his magnum opus *The Origin of a Land Flora* (1908), cites with approval, if not acceptance, Goebels strongly Lamarckian views. 8 Sir William Dyer, however, defends the Weismannian position. The majority of English zoologists are, however, enthusiastic Weismannists and go so far as to deny the possibility of transmission where their master would admit it. Thus in *The Times* of January 27, 1908, Sir Ray Lankester, whose headship no English zoologist would dream of questioning, writes:...



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
